

2011 Nationals Mayflower SC, Plymouth 14th to 19th August

Yup, it should be worth the effort. Plymouth is a lovely place. With the club a short distance from the city centre and space in the car park for both cars and boats (space for 1 of each with your entry subject to availability) it should be a good venue.

The bay the club is in is sheltered so there should be no launching through waves and those who have been before consider it an enjoyable place to sail.

For those who don't sail there's plenty to do as the leaflet enclosed with this magazine indicates. It's a major tourist area with plenty of accommodation, though early booking would be advised as the fireworks spectacular the same week is very popular.

Entry fee:

Whilst the 2011 entry fee is a little more than previous years it includes more than usual with 2 tickets per entry to both the mid week BarBQue and to the prizegiving at the end of the event. Note in particular the advantage in entering by the end of March, with a fee of £125 rather than the full £160 which would have to be paid from April onwards.

British Fireworks Championships Finals 16th & 17th August 2011

Considered one of the most spectacular pyrotechnic displays anywhere in the country the best place to watch is considered to be from the Hoe and foreshore right next to Mayflower S.C.

Six of the leading fireworks companies compete to become British Champion and to go forward to represent Britain at an International Competition. These finals are eagerly anticipated by many thousands of people every year and are held over 2 days. On Tuesday and Wednesday nights there is early evening entertainment laid on in the area. At 9.30 pm the 10 minute displays begin, with 3 competitors each night.

"Start your voyage of discovery by visiting spectacular Plymouth Hoe [behind the Mayflower Sailing Club] where you can climb Smeaton's Tower Lighthouse to enjoy the best view in Plymouth.

In the Elizabethan Barbican, you will find the Mayflower Steps, where the Pilgrim Fathers set sail for America, and Plymouth Gin Distillery, producers of Plymouth Gin since 1793. Nearby [opposite the sailing club] is the National Marine Aquarium, the largest aquarium in the UK with the deepest tank in Europe. Get a taste of Plymouth's seafaring history with a cruise into Plymouth Sound and up the River Tamar, past the Devonport Royal Dockyards, with its frigates and nuclear submarines; you can admire too Isambard Kingdom Brunel's Saltash Bridge.

The city is the region's shopping capital. The modern pedestrian centre, with its floral displays and water features, is a delight for shoppers and sitting alongside is the recently opened Drake's Circus shopping centre. You will find all the major retailers and a host of independent specialist outlets in Plymouth.

After dark the city comes alive with restaurants, clubs and bars. The Theatre Royal, one of the best theatres in the country, has a programme ranging from drama to musicals and Plymouth Pavilions is the major concert venue.

Many of Devon's fascinating historic houses are within easy access of Plymouth and the Tamar Valley railway line gives you the freedom to enjoy this entrancing area. www.visitdevon.co.uk/site/areas-to-visit/plymouth

Having met a number of Miracle sailors at Thornton Steward Sailing Club (T.S.S.C.) and visitors to our Miracle Open meetings, we quickly formed the impression that they were all enjoying themselves and really enthusiastic about the boat. This prompted us to think about buying a Miracle. No sooner had it occurred to us and we were overheard discussing it by Kenneth and Gillan Gibson and Janet and Malcolm Cummins, at our club. Gillan took us out for a sail in 'Great Expectations'; we really enjoyed it.

After a flurry of emails re available boats, we found ourselves leaving Delph S.C. towing 'Anabel', our 'new' Miracle.......... 7 days after our initial conversation.

Every Miracle sailor we met, since our new acquisition, asked us if we were going to the Nationals, at Beaumaris. Kenneth announced that he had booked "luxury accommodation" and he and Gillan invited us to share it. We were committed, our goals for 2010.... to compete in the Nationals and gain racing experience (when we got there our aims changed stay upright and finish the races!).

After an easy journey to Beaumaris we settled into 'Chez Ken'. On Saturday, 'Anabel' was berthed in Beaumaris; we were immediately struck by the help and

advice we were given to set her up. Lucky for us, we had parked next to 'In the Bag'; Sam and Geoff provided lots of advice and guidance along with their infectious enthusiasm.



Day 1...... we were lulled into a false sense of security. We'd had a relaxed sail out to the start and 2 very enjoyable races and no problems; sea sailing seemed straightforward enough, it was exciting and we'd survived.

Subsequent days saw changes in the weather and sea state; conditions became decidedly 'sporty'.

Consulting our oracles, we decided that the safest tactics for us were to try to start in clean air at one end of the line..... which would also avoid anyone else being taken out by us!

There were times after the start when we couldn't see the first mark. Sea salt-coated specs, stinging eyes and the

Great sailing was interspersed with some sightseeing, the obligatory afternoon nap...... this sea sailing lark can be tiring.....and making new acquaintances. encouragement, we came away with the 'Bay of Colwyn Trophy' for the fastest non-spinnaker boat.

What else did we bring back from our Beaumaris expedition (apart from aching wrists)? We came home a more experienced crew, slightly battered and bruised – but all the better for that. We had a fantastic week and, no doubt, got more out of the event because of the challenging conditions. We'd pushed ourselves so much further because of the encouragement from our fellow sailors.

What's challenge have we set ourselves for 2011..... Miracle Nationals Plymouth? Ken's already booked our luxury accommodation!

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

Summary of minutes

Girton – 13th November 2010

- Committee: Ken Gibson was confirmed as Chairman and 2 new committee members, Jon Aldhous and Paul Winn, were welcomed to Committee.
- **Moulds:** It was confirmed the Miracle moulds were now suitable insured.
- **Membership:** This had increased by 13 since the 2010 A.G.M.
- Membership: Ways of encouraging membership of the Association were considered:
 - Access to training, boat set-up assistance. Suggestion front end sailors be encouraged to hold informal sessions for all at open meetings and local club events.
 - Consider organising cruising events.
 - Send leaflet on Association to all club secretaries and fleet captains at clubs listed as having Miracles.
- Measurement: Kicker/vang—
 Following a straw poll at the A.G.M.
 the Committee agreed the advantage ratio should remain at 8:1.
- Measurement: Laminate sails—A
 proposal to allow these was discussed.
 Advice is to be sought from various
 sail makers as to durability, suitability
 and cost compared to conventional
 sailcloth.
- **Treasurer:** The current financial position is looking good.
- Website: Progress on the new site continues and feedback on the draft site was requested.


- Halo: Getting reports and results for the magazine was sometimes a problem and new ways of acquiring them are to be explored.
- Race calendar 2011: This was nearly complete and the few uncertainties were being pursued.
- National Championships 2011 at Mayflower, Plymouth: Arrangements are progressing.
- National Championships 2012:
 Ullswater is the proposed venue as the fleet is due another inland venue and this was a particularly popular location. The various other venues considered will be looked at for future years.
- R.Y.A. Dinghy Show, 5th & 6th March
 2011: Plans for the stand are progressing.
- Fleet allocations: A complex issue, it is considered desirable to draw up a single list with clear guidelines on how members move between the fleets. This should be on the website so it can be available at events.
- **Training:** The desirability of having training was identified and ways are to be sought to achieve this.
- Miracle Association Rules: It was considered a review of these would be useful.

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Hints and tips

Do you have any ideas that would help others? Let the editor know and they can be shared. To get the ball rolling here are a couple.

Dry suits: Help your dry suit to last as long as possible by not using conditioner when you wash garments used under your drysuit. *Dave Gebhard from Trident*

Consider tacking rather than gybing in strong winds. The manoeuvre has to be "sailed" and can take a lot of space, but can leave you upright when others are capsizing. *Gillan Gibson*

Nautical Sayings "Fits the bill"

This phrase used to describe something that is just what is required and is derived from the Bill of Lading. This was an inventory of goods received and a promise

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to deliver in the same condition signed by the captain of a merchant ship. When the ship reached its destination the cargo would be confirmed according to the bill.

The Travellers Trophy 2010

The objective of this Trophy is to encourage members to attend Open Meetings and to reward the member who travels the furthest in support of Open Meetings. The formulae for this is based solely on the distance travelled between home sailing club and the venue.
