## Chairman's Desk

Welcome to the summer issue of the Halo Magazine. I hope you, your family and friends are well and keeping safe.

As with everybody else in the UK, the Miracle Association activities, members and sailing clubs have been impacted by coronavirus. The spring sunshine has helped all of us cope with the lockdown.

At Whitefriars Sailing Club we are currently able to book a three hour sailing slot via the club website, with options for am, pm or evening for household groups, now with up to maximum of 15 households at any one time. The clubhouse is out of bounds with the exception of one toilet. We have seen four or five Miracles on the water in these social sessions together. It has been great to enjoy getting back on the water even without club racing. When the National Championships at Netley were inevitably cancelled, Lilly and I were absolutely gutted. Netley was the first nationals that we competed together, finishing every race with Lilly winning the prize of youngest crew aged just 8.

It is a wonderful club and we were looking forward to visiting their new clubhouse that replaced the dilapidated building we enjoyed back in 2017. Not that the condition of their clubhouse spoiled the event. The warm reception we received and the camaraderie from the camping and sailing area being so close together made it a fabulous nationals. Here's hoping we can get back there soon.

As a committee member, one of the problems cancelling the nationals has had though, is how do we hold our AGM this year?

When my club, Delph SC, was faced with the prospect of cancelling or postponing our AGM in the face of the coronavirus pandemic earlier this year, we decided to hold its AGM online instead. We looked at a number of packages which might enable our AGM to take place without members needing to attend in

person and decided to use electionbuddy.com https://
electionbuddy.com/. This online system enabled the club to email members with a link to its AGM papers along with access to secure online voting for each section. It resulted in the club's highest ever engagement rate for an AGM.

We took the agenda and replicated it electronically so people could work through it online using a link emailed to them with a letter explaining the change this year from a physical AGM, which was due to take place on Friday 20 March, to a digital AGM.

Over 50% of our eligible members took the opportunity to vote which has given us a better mandate than any physical AGM in recent years. Our members embraced what has possibly become the biggest democratic exercise in our club's history. Members felt involved and it has given a voice to those members who live a distance away - we even had a vote from Florida - and others who may not normally able to attend our AGM because of family or work commitments.

Electionbuddy allows free tests with up to 5 participants, so we tried it to see how it worked on a mobile phone and a computer, and with an older technologically challenged member, to ensure it was user-friendly. The club then imported the email addresses of all those eligible to vote and ran it for real. I can easily do this from membermojo, our GDPR compliant membership system

software will take members through each part of the agenda - including the minutes of last year's meeting, the chairman's report, suggested rule changes, election of officers and the accounts - with an option at the end of each section enabling you to vote either "FOR", "AGAINST" or "ABSTAIN". The feedback we have had is it is easy, simple and straightforward.

The Delph Sailing Club AGM was 'open' for 48 hours during which time members could email the management committee at the club if they wanted to raise any questions or ask for further information before voting. Sixty two members took part and voted compared with the 20 to 30 people who usually attend a physical AGM.

The results are not secret, it is akin to a show of hands but for the duration of the ballot it is not possible to see how anyone has voted so the process cannot

be influenced. Each vote has a unique key that is tied to the recipient's email address – preventing it from being shared or repeated - and all the results are fully auditable should there be any questions raised over legitimacy . As committee members, we are satisfied that running our AGM in an electronic format discharges our legal responsibility to the Miracle Association's constitution and given these unprecedented times, enables us to continue for another year. We hope to continue to use this system in the future to allow digital proxy voting for association members.

# Miracle Association Proposal for the AGM 2020

#### Rules of Measurement and Construction

Proposal to change the above Rules, for discussion at the Association's Annual General Meeting to be held at Netley Sailing Club on Thursday 6th August 2020.

Published in accordance with Rule 9 of the Rules of the Association.

#### **PROPOSAL**

Referring to the Rules of Measurement and Construction 2020.

#### **Buoyancy Checks**

Aim. To move to a situation where the owner and not the Association is responsible for the efficiency of a boats buoyancy. The wording of Rule 10 to be altered to remove all reference to a measurer, with the addition of a comment to delete or ignore all reference to Annual Buoyancy Inspections on current Measurement Certificates.

#### Current wording

#### Rule10 **BUOYANCY**

Buoyancy shall consist of three separate tanks, the efficiency of which shall be determined by inspection, or, if the measurer considers it necessary by air test. FRP boats may have a single tank plus sufficient positive buoyancy to remain afloat if holed.

#### **Proposed amended Rule to read:**

#### Rule 10 **BUOYANCY**

Buoyancy shall consist of three separate tanks, the efficiency of which shall be determined by *the owner*. FRP boats may have a single tank plus sufficient positive buoyancy to remain afloat if holed.

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#### Miracle stories

#### Brian Worrall on the day going nowhere had positive consequences

.....It was at the Plymouth Nationals 2011. I think it was on the Thursday. There was very little wind that day out in Plymouth Sound and in fact conditions had been light all week - unusual for a sea venue! I remember on one race we all ended up being towed back! Anyway, on this particular race we were in our usual position - towards the back! There was a leeward mark ahead and we noticed at least five Miracles in a bunch, none of who could get round the mark. The tide was running fast and dragged you the wrong side. We tried twice and, like the others, got pushed to port. Third time we went way out to Starboard and JUST made it. The tide pushed us onto the buoy but we got around. We DID OUR TURNS, and carried on. Behind us were at least 10 boats and we thought: "we will get a good position here!". It would take us up to Silver.....

Unfortunately, as we got around the final mark with the finishing line no

more than a say 10 - 15 boat lengths off, the wind COMPLETELY DIED! There were no other boats behind us and some boats mingling around the committee boat after the finish line. They were willing us on! But we just could not get any forward motion and in those days there was a time out of one and a half hours. We sat there for 20 minutes trying everything to move forward. We were talking to the committee boat we were that close!! We got timed out and a DNF. We were pretty hacked off at the time.

Anyway I think after this it was "back finish", rather than have a time limit, and give positions to all. I think they called it BRIAN'S LAW!

As a post script Richard Smith said we should have been standing further forward in the boat which I kind of knew but in the situation it just didn't occur...all about minimising the wetted area!!!

#### Miracle stories

Some of you will have seen Brian Mumford's beautiful new wooden Miracle which he built with his brother in law. There was clearly a great deal of skill involved. Well, more of the story has come to light and is worth taking advantage of. It transpires Steve has worked on everything from minesweepers, to super yachts, to Formula 1 race cars, to Miracles and you wonder what else! So when the company he works for, Gurit who used to be SP, wanted a sample section to take round the trade shows it was a part of a

Miracle hull that was chosen. Originally this issue of the Halo would have explained this and then suggested that anyone going to the Southhampton Boat Show drop in to Gurit's stand to see the Miracle hull section. The demonstration section was then due to go to the Munich Boat Show and then trade shows around the world. Well, the coronavirus put a stop to that, but the tale of the build, which was to demonstrate the use of a new range of products is still worth telling, though it will take more than one issue of the Halo.

The Gurit technical team has built a piece of a Miracle Dinghy to demonstrate the full capability of the Gurit AMPRO™ range which can be used for coating, bonding, filleting, filling,

sheathing and laminating. This article goes through the steps taken and the resins and fillers used to build the section.

Each piece was cut from 5mm Marine plywood using a CNC router so the fit was perfect, the design also allowed for a dry assembly format, meaning that the finished component could be quickly visualized.

The next step was to coat all the surfaces of the plywood with AMPRO™ SEAL to ensure the wood was protected and reduce resin absorption during the bonding process. With all the wood sealed, the entire surface was sanded ready for the next stages

The bulkheads were then located at regular intervals and the chine (intersection between the hull bottom and side) was laminated with AMPRO™ and glass reinforcement. Once cured, the bulkheads were filleted with AMPRO™ resin combined with a mixture of Microballoons and AMPRO™ silica

Once the fillets were cured, the assembly was strong enough to turn over and laminate the outer side of the chine. The laminate was finished with a peel ply in order to achieve a smooth finish which would minimise filling and fairing

It was at this time of the build that Covid 19 came into play and all non-production staff were sent home to work. Steve gathered up as many materials as possible and the miracle section constructed so far and took them all home to complete the build in his workshop. Gone was the air conditioned and temperature-controlled laboratory, replaced by a more typical environment that would be faced by a home boat builder: during the day work was carried out in a shed in ambient conditions and on colder nights the part was brought into the kitchen

The next stage was to fit the inner gunwale and longitudinal bulkhead. These were both bonded using AMPRO™ mixed with microfibres to create a strong joint. A fillet made with microfibres tends to give quite a rough finish and is usually only used on joints that will be concealed. As you can see in the picture, anything available to hand was used to add weight to the joints while they cured.
