I said at the top that I had a connection with the Plymouth Cup. I brought my first Miracle, no 1622, I called it ORAC after the computer in Blake's Seven, just shows how long ago it was. In 1982 I sailed it with my son Ashley at Ullswater in our first Nationals, but at Plymouth the next year he was indisposed and my daughter Judith was roped in instead. At the briefing in Plymouth sailors were warned that Portuguese Men of War (Phylsalia Pysalis), these being basically Jelly Fish with sail fins and a severe sometimes fatal sting, had been seen drifting up the Channel and into the Sound and to keep a careful look out for them

It so happened that in one of the midweek races on the way out to the start

in a stiffish swirling breeze we partially capsized at the exit from Sutton Harbour into Plymouth Sound proper. Judith had not had a lot of practice but I never knew she could react so fast, she was back lying in the boat and waiting for me to right it again in no time flat, quicker than you could say Jack Robinson, whoever he was, no relation I hope Paul.

I know she did feel proud at the Prize Giving when she was awarded the Plymouth Cup for the Youngest Crew, which seemed nearly as big as she was back then. I still live in hopes that her children might one day get interested in sailing and that their Mum doesn't tell them too much about the Physalia Pysalis beforehand.

Battle of the Classes 2016

The Battle of the Classes is a race run as part of Southampton Boat Show. Two boats from each dinghy class are invited to take part in this 90 minute pursuit race and this year it attracted 33 entries. Representing the Miracles were Brian Mumford and Neal Gibson in Neal's boat sporting a new laminate main sail and me (Nic) and Hannah in 3805.

The race was called the Battle of the Classes, but it was a day of multiple battles. The first battle was the conditions. The strong westerly wind and the constant traffic was causing a very confused sea, which was throwing the boat around. We arrived early in the start area to make sure we timed the first start so we would know exactly when we had to start. The first boat away was the Mirror and we were to start 11 minutes after. The start was positioned very close to the Boat Show and there were plenty of spectators on the pontoons and the moored yachts.

We were slightly late at the start and took a while to get the spinnaker up and set. Neal and Brian's start was much slicker and they had the early advantage. Just beyond the start was the first mark of the course, Pier Head Boy. We rounded this and were then on a close 3 sail reach. The wind which was already strong picked up further and with nowhere to go except into the side of a giant car carrier, we took the spinnaker down and continued on a quick two sail reach to the next mark, SG1.

Unfortunately, SG1 was in a big wind shadow just round the corner of the dock in the River Itchen. We hoisted the spinnaker and then had to gybe to make the mark. After SG1, we crossed Southampton Water to a mark called Magazine. We went for a long tack across the channel, but Neal tacked on a shift half way across. This kept them ahead at Magazine. After this short windward leg, we were now on a long fast two sail reach to the mark at the top of the course near the start area. As we approached this mark, the wind eased and we got in front of Neal and Brian. At this point, the battle is between the two of us, the Mirror and the Topper still a way in the distance, and the Firefly just appearing behind.

From the top mark, it was a short run to Pier Head and then harden up for a three sail reach to SG1. The wind was still strong but a shift in direction made this a fast and furious leg. We round SG1 to see a giant car carrier with a tug on its bow and one on its stern making its way up the river. It wasn't travelling that fast so we carried on to cross in front of it. The Harbour Master was not impressed and came charging over with his sirens on to warn us off. We tacked away and then gybed to go behind the car carrier. We then saw the Red Funnel Isle of Wight Ferry coming up at a rate of knots inside the car carrier. We bore away behind the ferry and saw Neal and Brian going between the car carrier and the ferry. Both of the ships moved out of the way quite quickly, but the 420 which was slightly further back didn't have a choice to make and went behind both ships and got in front while we were going round in circles.

The chase is on again to catch Neal and Brian. We were helped in this when they had to crash tack to avoid a Firefly as they approached Magazine. The wind started to ease and this favoured us and slowed the approach of the Europe. The three sail reach from Pier Head to SG1 gets us back in front of the Firefly.

The race is approaching its conclusion and we have the Mirror and Topper in sight, but are overhauled by the RS200 and Buzz at SG1. The time is up, but we carry on and sail through the moving finish gate which is between the committee boat and a RIB. These extra few minute allows the RS800 through but the final race results are confirmed by the trackers carried by all boats taking part.

The 420 was well sailed, the conditions favoured it and the wind dying towards the end held back the quicker boats. We survived our battles with the strong wind and waves, won our battle with Neal and Brian and more importantly survived the close call with the car carrier and the Red Funnel ferry. Hopefully seeing the Miracles racing in this event will inspire people to get into Miracle sailing. *Nic Smith, Miracle 3805*

Endeavour 2016 Hannah and Nick Smith's tale: Part 1 7th to 9th October 2016

This is an invitation event for all the champions of dinghy classes holding a national championship. This year there were 26 classes which included invitations to Ben Saxton, who sailed the Nacra 17 catamaran in Rio and Nikki Birrell who sailed the Skud 18 at the Paralympic games.

As with last year, the racing was sailed in RS200s which the competitors borrow or charter for the event and to make the boats performance equal, new sails are supplied by RS sailing for all boats. To help the sailors get familiar with the 200, a training session was organised for Friday afternoon. Steve Irish, a previous 420 national and world champion ran the coaching session. Steve started by introducing himself to the sailors as they were rigging to see what help they needed. The on the water training consisted of two 20 minute races. Once Steve had started the races he followed us videoing the boats. We sailed all the races gradually improving our starts and on Steve's advice were using a lot more kicker. The brief included watching video clips and a chat about the rules around tacking along the shore and tacking around the individual marks. We would be doing a lot of this over the next two days. Steve is a well respected coach and all the contenders were there at the debrief to see what they could learn.

After the debrief, it was the evening meal. Food is a big feature of the Endeavour weekend and after a hard training session, the pasta supper was most welcome. Our accommodation for the weekend was provided by a club member and was a cottage three minutes walk from the club. After an early start and a hard training session, we slept well.

At the briefing, we were encouraged to launch promptly to allow time to get to the race area. As is turned out, we had to wait for the wind to settle into the forecast 6 knots North Easterly. The first race was started at low water with very little tide running. We got a reasonable start and rounder the windward mark in the middle of the fleet and slipped back downwind finishing 24th. After the race finished, we were sailing along and were heading straight for another boat. There was a cry from the back of the boat and when I turned around Hannah had the tiller extension in her hand not attached to the tiller. The rubber universal joint had broken. We went to the committee boat and were told to wait close by rather than sail back to the club. The extension has a guick release universal joint and one of the RIBs took the broken pieces to ensure they brought the right replacement back with them. To our surprise they returned soon after, much quicker than if they had gone ashore, with a perfect replacement. Apparently, this spare extension was being carried by the RS Vareo sailors. Racing Rules of Sailing 2017-2020

As usual following the Olympics the Racing Rules of Sailing have been revised. This is one of the editions where it has been more a tidying up of the wording to bring greater clarity.

For most sailors, most of the time, the change of consequence is Race Officers having the option to use Flag U,

rather than a black flag, in the starting sequence. When U is flown if you are disqualified for being on the course side of the line at the start and there is a General Recall you are able join in subsequent starts. Rule 30.3.

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Miracle Association meetings Summary of minutes

Bolton – 19th November 2016

- **Committee:** Gillan Gibson was confirmed as secretary and Ian Brown was co-opted as a committee member.
- **Training events:** The possibilities for two training events in 2017 are to be explored.
- Halo: The Autumn 2016 issue has been published and the Winter 2016 is in preparation.
- **Membership:** Promotional/invitational packs members can distribute to Miracle

owners in their clubs are to be compiled and made available to those who request them to encourage new memberships.

- **Communications:** There are various videos of Pwllheli and Hunstanton Nationals and it is planned to put them on Facebook and the website.
- Dinghy Show 2017: A standard association sized stand was applied for and a good location in the Great Hall close to other major exhibitors such as Rooster,

Hartley Boats, Sea Sure, etc, has been allocated. Arrangements have been made to supply a boat for the stand and manning is to be arranged.

- **Treasurer:** The Association is in a financially sound position.
- Racing Calendar 2017: Organisation for the new season is well underway with some events confirmed and others still under discussion. There are a number of new venues such as Port Dinorwic and the return of others such as Staunton Harold.
- Nationals 2017 at Netley Brian briefed the committee on his visit and the arrangements for 2017's event were discussed. The SigneTs are to join us again.
- Nationals 2018 and future years: Various options were discussed and the potential for sharing with other fleets confirmed. *Inlands to sea venues:* It was noted a straw poll at the AGM was in favour of a 1:1 ratio.
- Miracle Nationals Trophies: Youth and Junior: To broaden the opportunities for the younger element of the fleet the various trophies for Junior and Youth were considered. It was decided:
 - The upper age of Youth Championship participants to be extended from 18 to 21 years old, in line with many other fleets.
 - \Diamond ~ There would be 3 perpetual trophies
 - 1. Youth: 16 to 21 years old at the qualifying date.
 - 2. Junior: 15 years old and under at the qualifying date.
 - Young Junior: 13 years old and under at the qualifying date. This would require an additional trophy.
 - The qualifying date is the date of the first scheduled Main Championship race.
 - For the helm and crew of the first boat in each of the above categories

there will be a plaque/trophy and certificate for both helm and crew to keep.

Martin Bathe offered to see if the results could be age adjusted.

Main Championship: There is to be an additional trophy for the lowest placed boat in the series which has sailed in every race. Louis Moulden has offered to provide a trophy.

Main Championship: The gap in the age related trophies, 19 to 39 years old was noted, particularly as it is the younger end of the fleet which the Association wishes to encourage. It was decided to create 2 new trophies:

Highest placed helm 18 to 29 years Highest placed helm 30 to 39 years The Association would provide the trophies.

- Measurement:
 - Laminate sails: The option to have a laminate mainsail comes in to effect 1st January 2017. Neal Gibson had been issued with a dispensation to use a laminate sail at the Battle of the Classes event.
 - Laminate sails Red batten pockets: The Committee considered red batten pockets on the laminate sails and considered them acceptable.
 - Fathead sail: There was no general enthusiasm for this option so it is not being pursued.
 - Measurement Rules: The Rules had been updated and copies of the relevant documents are available on the Association's website from where they can be downloaded. Brian has also issued revised pages of the Measurer's Guide to the relevant people.
