


Being on Committee

Car topped Miracle

Marc Nye found this bit of kit which, though designed for kayaks allows him to roof top his Miracle.

Photo 1 shows the rollers on the rail. It is important to ensure rack is loaded square to the car so they sit on the rail.


Photo 2 the rack secured on the roof rails

Photos 3 & 4 lowering the rack ready for loading

Photo 5 thread the tie down strap. The buckle is in my left hand. As it is high sided it would be difficult to reach if the boat were loaded first.

Photo 6 As the rack is reloaded it must be held high and straight so the off side engages with the lug at the far end of the bar. The hole at the extreme right of photo 1 is for the "securing pin" once the rack is in position on the roof.

Photos 7 & 8 are in course of loading it onto the rack prior to raising it onto the roof. You will see that you don't have to lift it very far.

Remember to Check, Clean, Dry

Did you know that one adult Quagga Mussel can produce up to one million larvae in a year? And that's just one of the reasons why it's so important for all dinghy sailors follow 'Check Clean Dry' to stop the spread of this and other alien species around the UK's freshwater sailing venues.

The Quagga Mussel comes from the south-east corner of Europe and was discovered in Wraybury Reservoir and the Wraybury River in 2014. Along with other species such as the Zebra Mussel and Killer Shrimp, it is highly invasive and can cause immense damage to the environment, from clogging up water treatment equipment and outcompeting native species for food to encrusting sailing equipment and propellers of RIBs and tenders.

Non-native species are species that have established themselves outside of their normal range. The most likely way the species arrive in the UK is in ship ballast water, on hull fouling, through aquaculture escapes or the plant and animal import trade. Once in the UK, recreational boating, including the dinghy racing circuits, can provide a secondary means for a species to spread into new water bodies.



Eradication of most invasive species is extremely difficult which is why The Green Blue - the joint environment project of the Royal Yachting Association and British Marine Federation - is urging all boaters to follow the Check Clean Dry routine.

CHECK

Check equipment and clothing for live organisms – particularly in areas that are damp or hard to inspect before moving to a new location.

CLEAN

Use clean water to thoroughly hose down all parts of the boat, launching trolley, trailer and equipment that come into contact with the water before leaving the site. Remember to get into the nooks and crannies, such as tyre treads.

Drain water from every part of the boat and all equipment that can hold water. Soak equipment and clothing in hot water on site or when you return home as this will improve the chances of killing adults and microscopic larvae which are invisible to the eye.

DRY

When you get home, let the boat and sails dry out for as long as possible. Also dry clothing, footwear and buoyancy aids – some species can survive for up to two weeks in damp conditions!

How to identify a Quagga Mussel

Quagga Mussels are small (no more than 4cm across) with a dark brown and light brown stripy shell. When placed on its front it will roll to one

side and it has an undulating (as opposed to a straight, horizontal) seam between the shells.

Endeavour Trophy (Part 2)

Last time we left Hannah and Nic recovering from a broken tiller and preparing for their next race.....

.....We were close to the line at this start and as boats tacked away our air got cleaner. We tacked on the lay line and rounded in about 10th place. We gybed back to the south shore for extra time, but the boats that stayed in the starboard gybe had more wind which dropped us to mid-fleet. The course had a windward gate and as we tacked for the gate Hannah fell over the side. She held on to the mainsheet, we didn't capsize, but getting back aboard took a while dropping us towards the back of the fleet. Hannah felt better when she saw Endeavour star Nick Craig do exactly the same thing at the top mark. Much to our surprise, the RIB found us between races and gave us back our own fully repaired tiller extension.

Our newly repaired extension didn't bring us any luck in the third race and we found ourselves coming into the windward mark on the port layline, dodging the boats coming away from the mark with their spinnakers up. The only luck we had in this race was when the RS Aero5 boys hit the leeward mark which stopped us being last.

Race four gave us our best result of the weekend. The tide was coming in for this race and wind had moved around towards the east and had reduced in strength. The course was moved to account for these changes. The committee boat end was favoured as this was closest to the shore. The congestion pushed us into the second row start so we tacked for

the shore as soon as we could. Part of the fleet persisted on tacking up the middle against the tide. We tacked early to keep clean air, but had to tack again to make the mark. The incoming tide caught out the RS Aero5 boys who were swept on to the windward mark and were caught by the on water judge. In this race, we kept the downwind simple, come away from the windward mark on the starboard tack and held on until we hit the downwind lay line. On the second upwind leg, we marked the shore and made a perfect lay line tack.

After a long day on the water, we were ready for our post-race pasta and to find out what had been happening at the front of the fleet. Ben Saxton, last years runaway winner was leading, but hadn't had it all his own way. Lighter winds and a bigger more competitive fleet meant that even those at the top were counting some big scores. After packing away, we got changed for the Endeavour dinner. On our table were the boys from the 29er, the Topper and the father and son team Paul and Mark Oakley who sailed the RS400. Our tiller extension saviour junior (Jim Hood) from RS Sailing was also on our table. It turned out Paul had been sailing 505s at the same time as me and my brother Barry and remembered our yellow boat. After the fantastic meal, we were treated to the highlight of the weekend for me when Nikki Birrel, one of our Paralympic sailors from Rio told us his story of winning the bronze medal. Earlier in the evening he had brought his medals (Rio and London) in for us to see and hold.



When I was watching the Olympic and Paralympic games in the summer, I never dreamt I would see and hold a medal.

Sunday's forecast was for more wind from the same direction. The tide was going out for the first race which meant the tide was pushing the boats across the start line. This resulted in a general recall and the race got away on the second start with only an individual recall.

Race two on Sunday was started at low water, slack tide. This was our worst race, result wise. A late decision about which leeward mark to round saw us hit and go the wrong side of the mark. We then gybed and Hannah hit her head hard on the boom. We had to unwind our course and do a 360 degree penalty turn.

Normal service was resumed in race three. Race four was our last chance

of the weekend to make a good start. We did have a good start, but it was recalled. We didn't do as well at the second attempt. We tried to get clear air on the windward leg and this meant pushing out into the tide.

So our second Endeavour was over. Our goal to have more boats behind us than last year was achieved, we didn't capsize, but we came away feeling we could have done better. Unfortunately the chance to have another go is to become a champion, which in itself is a rare and hard thing to achieve. Last year I said that competing in the Endeavour trophy was a once in a lifetime opportunity. This second opportunity to sail against and with the current best helms and crews at this well run and challenging event was just as special.

Alternative propulsion!

I made up a whale fluke shaped flipper assembly which fitted on the rudder pintles and would propel the boat at about 4 knots when pushed up and down, and it was steerable. Standing at the back operating it meant too much transom drag. It should have been fitted in place of the centreboard. I guess that wouldn't pass measurement, but the idea was to get you back if the wind died when you're a long way from shore. It would possibly act as a fin as on America Cup boats! Anyone care to experiment? A small drilled hole under the gunwale each side allowed me to secure wooden ply fittings carrying a rowlock, clamped at the aft end of the deck cut-out, so that it could be rowed. (It is fine at low speed but you yaw uncontrollably at high speed without rudder)
